

S eason of resurrection

VV elcome

Welcome to St. John's during Easter. This is the last Sunday of the season!

Easter is an event in the life of God and the world after which nothing was the same again. Nothing could be. In Jesus' rising, death was unseated as the end of existence, as the owner of the last word, and as the hardest wall of absolute certainty.

The empty tomb bears witness to a new truth. Now we live in a different world with different rules. Now we stand up. No longer bound by the limited laws dictated by death, we can live according to the terms of resurrection. We speak and sing and see the world with the language and lenses of this deep and destabilizing power that God has revealed in the risen Jesus.

This takes some getting used to, friends.

We need to practice. It's why we celebrate Easter every year, and why we take fifty days—7 Sundays—to do it. We gather Sunday after Sunday to share the news and tell the stories of the ordinary people and extraordinary power that continue to flow from the morning of Jesus' rising.

When we say "Christ is risen!" we don't mean again. We mean still. And this is a claim and a cry we offer a hurting and exhausted world. Christ is risen still.

Easter dawns in 2023 still shrouded in the smoke of war. Easter dawns this year on a planet that is still warming and on people who feel unable to slow or stop this creeping catastrophe. It dawns on plants and animals who will enter extinction this year because of human indifference and greed. It dawns on neighbors and neighborhoods who languish beneath and within structures shaped by cruelty and sustained by racism. The feast of Easter calls us to embrace and revel in the reality of resurrection–even as we deal daily with the real and ongoing forces of death at work in our world and in our lives. These are the terms of Resurrection.

Through Christ, with Christ, in Christ, by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, we worship you eternally in songs of pure unbounded praise. Amen.

The leader breaks the bread. Silence is kept.

The risen Christ is our host, and he bids us come and celebrate the feast, to know the power of resurrection, the joy of heaven, the glory of God's grace.

We come to the table for the gifts of God.

communion

Please come to the table, whether you are single, married or divorced, drinking, using or sober, abled, disabled, or ill, gay, straight, or discovering, wealthy, getting by or in debt. Christ meets us all.

We approach the altar beginning with those sitting in the last rows; they shall be first. Approach the rail from the left aisle and take a cup; used cups go on the tray on the right. You may receive only bread, only wine, or both. Our Eucharistic bread is handmade and robust. If you prefer a wafer, please tell your server. Receiving the bread and wine is the central act of worship in the Episcopal Church.
